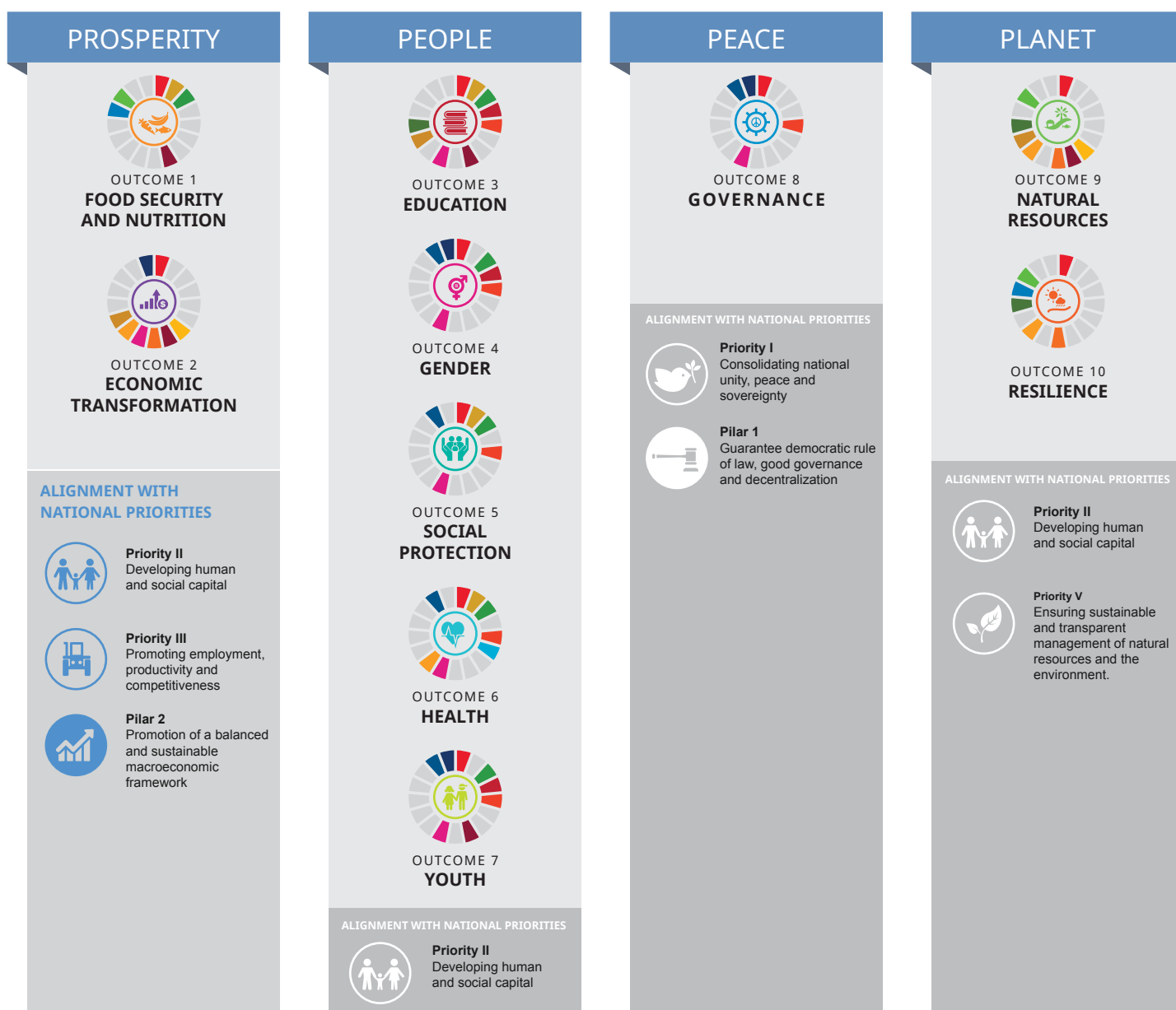


## UN support to Mozambique

The UN continues to support the Government of Mozambique after 40 years of strong partnership and collaboration. The current United Nations Development Assistance Framework for Mozambique (UNDAF) 2017 – 2021 is the expression of the Government of Mozambique's and the United Nations' priorities and strategic direction to support national development. It is aligned with national and international development instruments, notably the Government's Five Year Programme, 2015-19 and the Sustainable Development Goals (Agenda 2015-2030). With the approval of this new development agenda 2030, the UN places itself as trusted

partner to support the Government aiming at the attainment of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The UNDAF has been developed jointly among 22 UN agencies and with Government institutions and partners in line with the principle of "Delivering as One" and Global Partnership for Effective Cooperation. The framework is based on a situation analysis of the main development issues in the country, reflection on UN's comparative advantages and lessons learnt from the implementation of the previous UNDAFs.
